This past September I had my first class, "Gospel-Driven Spirituality." It was an invaluable time for personal renewal in the gospel. I look forward to my next class in February. Please pray for me as I try to balance ministry and classwork.

As for our church, over the past eight months our Session has felt a growing conviction to relocate our church to a new space. The possibility of relocating the church has been both exciting and stressful. We are still in a position of praying, discussing, and waiting. On behalf of our church, I ask for your prayers. If we move, we want to honor the KM that birthed us. We also want to bless the new community we will be a part of. But while we wait on God, we hope to maintain our focus and efforts on the gospel-work that needs to be done in our church, in our city, and in the world.

Our family life has been rich and full. Our kids enjoy having both sets of grandparents nearby. With Nathaniel having started 1st grade, Laura now formally teaches all three kids! On top of homeschooling the kids, Laura also serves as the Children's Director at church. We hope that both at home and at church we will faithfully raise up the next generation for Christ. Anderson is now in sixth grade. He is a growing boy of many passions – the Bible, sports, games, and socializing. Libby is in fourth grade. She loves playing the piano and helping mom with various projects at home. Our little Nathaniel is now a young boy. He is full of life and likes to play with his older siblings.
